Back in **1989**, I bought *Knit a Fantasy Story* by Jan Messent, and planned to make a variation on the rug in it for our son's 3rd birthday. A few years passed and I realized that Matthew had outgrown this play rug idea, so it all just got put away. Sometime after lock-down hit this year, it occurred to me that Matthew's son was going to turn 3 this summer, and this would make a great present. I had decided to make the rug as 8 x 8 inch square tiles, with



connecting paths or stream across the mid-points of the tiles, so that a child could re-order the mat each time they got it out. The idea being that it is suit-

able for them to use for adventures with their toy cars, boats and little people.



The rug squares are a mix of traditional wool rug hooking and stitching, knitting, embroidery and even crocheted lettuces and cabbages. My husband was not pleased when I cut up one of his holey sweaters as a base for some of the fields, but it did mean the

project got finished in time, and he got to contribute to it too! (Just how many old sweaters with holes does he need for gardening anyway?!!)

It feels really good to have completed this 31-year-old project, and I hope that my grandson will enjoy playing with it.

Award-winning fiber artist Sue Bleiweiss creates vibrant colorful and whimsical quilted fiber art collages using her own hand dyed cotton. Sue has written three books about the techniques she uses, written numerous magazine articles and has appeared on several TV programs. Her award-winning quilts have been exhibited internationally and reside in private collections worldwide.

Whole Cloth Quilting and Quilter's Yoga with Heidi Parkes

Heidi Parkes is a quilter and mender living in Milwaukee. She taught high school art in Naperville for 9 years and continues to pursue her passion by lecturing and leading workshops across the country. Celebrating the hand is an essential

component in Heidi's clothing repairs and quilts. She is inspired by the Japanese aesthetic of wabi-sabi. Whether visibly hand-pieced, intricately machine-pieced, or a wholecloth quilt, her art is infused with meaning and history, employing traditional techniques including: Korean Jogakbo patchwork, Seminole patchwork, American knots and improvisation, Japanese and Indian hand quilting, and European hand embroidery. Often using



specific textiles, like an heirloom tablecloth or bed sheet, Heidi adds subtle meaning and material memory from the start.

• Lecture Nov 10, 9:30 am: Quilt Update and Hand Yoga It's been 3 years since I was a guest artist at NSNG. I've been busy sewing in that time. My work has shifted to be nearly all hand piecing and hand quilting, and I'm as productive as ever! This workshop will bring you behind the scenes into my process. Then, we'll practice some yoga together. I'm a certified yoga therapist, and from the comfort of our chairs, we'll do a 20 minute routine aimed at caring for our hands, forearms, necks, and eyes. If you can sew and use a computer, you're 'fit enough' for this routine, and if you sew half as much as I do, it will feel great on your hands.

• Whole Cloth Quilting WORKSHOP: Nov 10, 1:30 - 5:00 pm; Nov 11, 10:30 am - 12:30 pm & 2:30 - 5:00 pm; Nov 12, 10:30 am - 12:30 pm & 2:30 - 5:00 pm We will start with a large piece of fabric, and then add to that with visible hand piecing, appliqué style. We will learn to add small and very large pieces of appliqué with a variety of stitches including running, ladder, and whip. We will



also cover embroidery for our quilts with the running stitch and backstitch to add elements of drawing and text with your own handwriting on the quilt. Plan to make a quilt that's between 3 to 5 feet in size, depending on your preference. If you want something bigger or smaller than that, I won't hold you back!

Linda Cortright is the editor and publisher of "Wild Fibers" magazine, the only publication focused on all aspects of the natural fiber industry from traveling nomads and their camels in the Gobi Desert, to working with veiled weavers in Oman.

Its mission is to understand and promote the role natural fibers play throughout the world, specifically highlighting developing countries.

In 2014, Cortright launched a campaign to build Pangong Craft Center. It is the first cashmere craft center in India's High Himalayas specifically designed to

enable a village of semi-nomadic women to earn income by creating value-added cashmere products (handspun yarn, shawls, scarves, etc.). The Pangong Craft Center represents an

extraordinary opportunity for women and their families who have few opportunities for employment living at 15,00 feet.

Travel with "Wild Fibers" editor, Linda Cortright, to some of the world's most remote and frequently misunderstood

Show Off Your HATS!

An article in the April 1984 issue of handmade magazine inspired this challenge. The writer notes that hats were originally "a very practical means of protection. These strange and sometimes absurd objects which we place on our heads or hide in our closets do tend to inspire extremes in thought and behavior."

Hats have been known to "have historically served as a form of public identification; to contribute to the distinctions we make between kings and commoners, popes and priests, soldiers and civilians."

On the lighter side – there was the "Hatter, whose tea-time antics so exasperate Alice." Then there was Charlie Chaplin and his bowler; Carmen Miranda and her fruit; Darth Vader and his helmet. "One is very often unthinkable without the other."

The article also says to heed essayist Lance Morrow's warning: 'Never try to wear a hat that has more character than you do."



• YOUR CHALLENGE is to go against that heed. Create a hat that has so much character that it can stand alone but needs YOU to show it off.

- Your hat should: tell a story or make a point; describe your life; remind you of a special moment; or a special place you visited or a place you want to visit.
- Use your sewing needle, sewing machine, knitting needle, crochet hook or other needlework techniques. Use your favorite technique or use them all for at least 75% of the work.
- Make a hat from scratch or work on an existing one. If working on an existing hat, 75% of the decorations must be new.
- The finished hats will be due at our December 1st meeting. Workshop Gift Certificates will be awarded:
 First Place \$100, Second Place \$75 and

Third Place -\$50.

John Marshall has been living his dream, his passion of working with Japanese textiles and designs for the past fifty years. His one-of-a-kind garments have been exhibited around the world, including shows sponsored by Kodansha, the Embassy of



Japan, the Textile Museum in DC, and the US State Department. His writing career started with clothing design in the form of Make Your Own Japanese Clothes, Patterns and Ideas for Modern Wear, published by Kodansha in 1988,

and still in print. Since then, he has gone on to publish, teach, and lecture extensively about Japanese textiles, dyeing, and clothing design..

design elements and inspirations in his own contemporary work.


• Japanese Clothing Design WORKSHOP:


Master Knitting Class With Cecelia Campochiaro

Cecelia Campochiaro appeared on the knitting scene in 2015 with her debut book, *Sequence Knitting*. Knitting was a casual pastime until she had an "ah-ha"

moment in 2010 and realized that interesting textured fabrics could be created by the simple repetition of a sequence of stitches. This idea evolved and led to her writing *Sequence Knitting*, which is a reference book about this mindful approach to knitting.

In the years since Sequence
Knitting debuted, she has continued to develop new ideas in knitting. Sequence
Knitting is about texture, and her new book Making Marls, is about color. Making marls, the act of working multiple strands together as one, is an old technique, but has never before been written about as an important technique in hand knitting.

Cecelia lives in Silicon Valley, where for many years she developed specialized microscopes used in computer chip manufacturing. Textiles, photography, and the arts have been a lifelong passion running in parallel with her technical life. In high school and college, even though her main

As knitters, we create fabric. By combining sequence knitting, different fibers, fine



stripes, and marls, an extraordinary range of interesting and beautiful, reversible fabrics can be created with hand knitting. This master class will immerse students in how sequence knitting works, how to develop a desired gauge and hand, and how to work with yarns of different colors and thicknesses. It will also cover how to work with marls as a colorwork technique. Students will receive multiple patterns they can make, including a small cowl that uses marls and sequence knitting.

WORKSHOP with Bill Keller – Alabama Chanin™- Inspired T-Shirt

Bill Keller brings his love of tinkering and fixing things to his passion for quilting and sewing. He enjoys using his hands to create, and believes that the skills he's developed are useful across all the different mediums he works in.

With a degree in Mechanical Engineering, Bill worked in the nuclear power industry for several years. He learned blacksmithing and knifemaking in North Carolina, and set up his own forge, with which to make tools, knives, and jewelry. He worked in a small shop fabricating high-end custom home and office furnishings in metal and wood, and has done a variety of woodworking and home-improvement projects.

Bill brings his intense curiosity and focus to quilting and sewing.

His aunt, a renowned quilter, introduced him to the art, and it turned out to be a great fit with his engineering background, love of tinkering, and analytical bent. In addition to a wide range of quilting projects, he makes zipper pouches, bags and garments, often creating his own patterns based on things he owns, but has worn out.

While Bill appreciates a wide variety of quilt styles, he is drawn to bold, graphic quilts made of solid fabric, which many call "modern quilts" but which are often based on older concepts. He considers himself a modern traditionalist. He was

introduced to Gwen Marston on a trip several years ago and had the great pleasure of helping her sort through several hundred quilts, inspecting close up many things he had only seen in books, including a quilt that she generously gifted him as a thank you.

Bill has taught blacksmithing to several long-time students and has taught beginning sewing classes at Evanston Stitchworks. His teaching philosophy is – just get started; even if you mess up, you are still learning. He teaches best by doing and demonstrating, versus lecturing or explaining.



Alabama Chanin™- Inspired T-Shirt WORKSHOP

Mar 2, 1:00 - 4:00 pm; Mar 4, 1:00 - 4:00 pm Bill Keller will be teaching how to make your own Alabama Chanin™ -inspired garment. He will be demonstrating how to create a t-shirt using a stencil you design and create, or a pattern he will provide. The stencil is used to apply textile paint to one layer of knit material. A second layer of material is placed underneath and they are sewn together using the painted areas as a guide. Finally, selected areas are cut away to reveal the fabric beneath. Examples of different looks will be shared and discussed. This is not a class on garment construction which is why we are using purchased t-shirts. If you wish to create a different garment, he will discuss the process and some additional considerations, but you will be on your own to construct it. He advises to start small and not embark on a huge project for your first attempt. The project will hint at the many possibilities for future explorations.

There will be 2 sessions, each 3 hours long, with a day in between to allow for making the stencil and allowing the paint to set.

NOTE: The stencil for the shirt I am wearing was purchased from Alabama Chanin™ and WILL NOT be the one used in class. I will be using my own designs. The stencil I provide to students (if they choose to use it) will be my own design and/or non-copyright protected. My hope is that each student will create their own stencil design.

Bias Plaited Basket Weaving With Jackie Abrams
