

• I did these in response to the prompt *Emergence*. The first piece is called "Unmasking." I used a photo I took in my garden last summer. I traced the image onto cotton, painted with acrylic fabric paints and

It is called "Aloe with Butterflies." I wanted to express wild optimism that the butterflies were coming toward the healing aloe plant sitting at my window and the fantasy that the indoors was safe again.








Linda Norby

I really enjoyed the workshop since it was a complete departure from my usual work, weaving tapestries. The difference between the colors of the two shirts is very subtle. The inner shirt is a mottled blue. Bill suggests cutting away most of the inner shirt, but I like the thickness of both together.
- I also recently completed this tapestry. It's 30 x 46" and I can't say much about it. I just start sketching and I ended up with this. They take me longer now because I adopted a cat named Ilse who likes to "help."

Fine Art of Fiber - November 5 - 7, 2021

The Fine Art of Fiber is tentatively planning on an in-person show which will run Friday-Sunday, November 5-7, 2021 (NO Thursday night). Viability and capacity for any in-person show will be determined by Chicago Botanic Garden guidelines which are currently at Illinois level 4 restrictions (50 person limit in Regenstein); we are optimistic that this will change as Illinois gradually reopens.

At this time, the DEADLINE for submissions for the exhibit and boutique is AUGUST 1, 2021.

Forms will be available on the FAOF website JULY 1, *fineartoffiber.org*. Work submitted must be finished, and members are urged to submit as professional a photograph of their work as possible, ideally so that photos can be used on the website and for a virtual show if we must do a sudden pivot again this year. There is a non-refundable \$10 submission fee per exhibition piece (fees to be used to underwrite FAOF equipment storage and website redesign costs).

I participated in Bill Keller's March workshop on stitching using the *Alabama Chanin*™ technique. Instead of using T-shirts, I decided to make a tunic with some knit fabrics that I had.

I created the circle design using my computer and painted it onto the knit fabrics. Then I did the stitching in the yellow thread. Interestingly I tried some threads that I thought would be a better match, but it blended in too well with the colors of the paint and fabric. So I switched to the yellow, which really contrasts nicely. After doing the stitching, the grey fabric was cut away from the centers of the circles revealing the burgundy fabric un-



derneath. I added interest at the neckline and the sleeves using the contrasting color and additional stitching.

Bill's class was fun and informative and motivated me to finally get some sewing done. Thanks, Bill!





Laine Cobb

I really wanted to make circular quilts. These two are the first ones that I did the quilting on. They are 45" in diameter. They have 8 pockets all around. My husband fashioned a thick wire to hold them flat. They are hung by that wire. I have done nothing but quilt since last March. I don't really have any deep inspirations or techniques. I just want to keep busy.

• The bluebird mini art quilt (13.5 x 16.5") was started in a class in Michigan three years ago. I decided to finally finish it. The class was using Derwent



inktense pencils. I added borders and embellished the bird with hand embroidery and machine quilting.

• The leather shoulder bag is from a Tag Along Tote pattern by Atkinson Designs. I modified the

pattern using leather and fabric so I could sew it on my regular machine. I have made this bag many times. It is my favorite!


NSNG Membership Renewal

Kathleen Field


For 17 years, I made and sold my quilts in craft shows, art shows, galleries, and at the Blind Faith Cafe in Evanston. I also sold my quilt designs professionally and traveled around the country and the world. I retired from the quilt world in 2019 and began my embroidery journey.

While sitting at home this past year, I took the skills I learned in designing quilts to designing and selling embroidery kits. It's been an exciting adventure so far – turning ideas into designs and designs into finished pieces.

In 2018 and 2019, I took 2 trips to London to visit my daughter. We traveled around the United Kingdom and France and I took many photos. When I decided to make embroidery kits, I looked back at my photos and based my designs on them.

I sketch in Adobe Illustrator and design and redesign. Illustrator is a wonderful program to make revisions during all steps of the design process. Once I have the design completed, I print it on a linen/cotton blend. Then I decide on the kinds of stitches and the colors of the DMC floss.

The next step is to make the sample, which takes the most time. I make changes during this process; sometimes I don't like the colors, sometimes I don't like the stitch. I redo the sewing many times. I often add stitches once I complete the embroidery. After I completed sewing My Bright Pink Scooter, I added the French knots in the scooter and windows.

Our Open Topic Meet-Up is always a place where you can share your latest project, get new ideas, ask for advice on a challenging piece or just catch up with fellow needle arts enthusiasts. This month we will also re-visit Quilting.

• Tricia Baldwin finished this quilt during 2020. The design is from her favorite quilt shop, A Different Box of Crayons. "The thing I love about Lynn (the owner of the shop) is that she incorporates mixed media. She uses quilter's cotton, wool, silk, wovens, and anything else you can think of. The quilt in the picture is not printed quilter's cotton — it's woven cottons. From her inspiration, I used silk matka for the dark gray divider with a mustard/purple woven for the circles. These were all from her shop in Glen Ellyn."

- Marcia Hartnell is one member who has made many charity quilts:

"I made this Bow Tie quilt top (61 x 77") for the Quilts of Valor group in Traverse City, Michigan. The pattern was a Missouri Star tutorial that caught my fancy. I think I have made 5 or 6 quilt tops. Other members of the group do the long-arm quilting. We meet monthly at the VFW which gives us space to work and store supplies. The quilts are awarded to veterans who are nominated by friends and family. Some of the group members conduct the ceremonies.

Being a lifelong sewer and crafter, my quilt journey began after retirement and summers in Lake Ann, Michigan, where I joined a small group of quilters that met weekly to work on hand projects. This expanded to a larger group, meeting at the church and bringing our sewing machines to do larger projects.



In Michigan I participate in three quilt groups. Each group has a charity arm donating quilts and other stitched items that are needed to hospitals, nursing homes and social service organizations.

I have no idea how many charity quilts I have made in the last ten years. With each quilt I learned techniques and patterns and my personal preferences regarding quilt designs. Each provided an opportunity to explore the world of quilting. Some of the quilts were totally finished by me but mostly I pieced the tops and a long-arm quilter quilted them."

Mini Workshop with Tricia Baldwin: Quilt Piecing with Fusible Interfacing



- Thurs, April 22, 9:30 11:30 am Fee: \$10 Tricia Baldwin will teach you how to use fusible interfacing to make quilt piecing fun, fast and successful! Have you ever seen a Waterfall quilt, wanted to make one but the thought of sewing hundreds (thousands?) of small squares together is daunting? Fusible interfacing is the answer. This is not a new technique, but Tricia has tips, helpful techniques, and experience to guide you. This is an invaluable tool to have in your quilter's toolbox. The focus will be on piecing, but we will also briefly cover how interfacing is used in applique and t-shirt quilts.

Favorite Places with Valerie Goodwin



Valerie Goodwin is a mixed media fiber artist and architect, whose works of fine art are included in museum and private collections. Most of her work is inspired by a love of aerial views of landscapes and cities. Many of her quilts are based on maps. Goodwin's art has moved through various stages from traditional quilting to an interest in abstract expressionism and, currently, it is inspired by real and imaginary landscapes and cities. In some cases, her work shows an architectural sense of space with an archeological perspective. In others, the network of the city and its built form is more prominent. Valerie received degrees in architecture from Washington University and Yale University.

- LECTURE: Tues, Apr 6, 9:30 am: A Dialogue Between Quilting and Architecture Valerie is a practicing architect and this lecture focuses on the common ground between architecture and quilting: Shape, composition, ordering systems, color, texture, and pattern.

and collaged mixed media techniques, you will create a mixed media fiber art map. The instructor will guide you through a series of steps that will provide opportunities to learn about design while giving you the freedom to experiment within a structured framework.

Paper Weaving with Helen Hiebert

• LECTURE: Tues, May 4, 9:30 am: The Secret Life of Paper

Internationally recognized paper and book artist Helen Hiebert will share examples of her most recent work, including her limited edition artists books, videos and installations. She will talk about the Mother Tree Project, her traveling community installation about motherhood, and the Secret Life of Paper, a short film about abaca, a papermaking

fiber. She will also discuss her adventures in writing how-to books, teaching online and using social media in the paper world.

Helen Hiebert constructs installations, sculptures, films, works in paper and artists books using paper as her primary medium. She teaches, gives lectures and exhibits her work internationally. She is the author of five paper craft books, writes a popular blog, The Sunday Paper and hosts the podcast Paper Talk. Helen lives and works in the Colorado Rocky Mountains.

Explore the basics and push the boundaries of paper weaving as you weave straight and curved strips, add a warp, make shaped weavings and cut windows to reveal paper layers. Helen will show examples of her work and that of other artists for inspiration, and we will weave create structural paper weavings, such as cards, books and lanterns. Use your own papers, purchase a kit containing gorgeous Japanese papers, or mix and match!

Weaving with Natural Materials with Susan Raber Bray

Susan Raber Bray, born in New York and living in Vermont since the early 70's, works in several media including clay, natural fibers, pastels, and oils. Her work is shown both nationally and internationally. In recent years, Susan has held clay



workshops in France, England, Italy and Hawaii. As a visiting artist sponsored by the Vermont Council on the Arts from 1989-2007, she has traveled throughout the state teaching in numerous Vermont public schools.

She has also taught part time at the University of Vermont for over 30 years

in the art department and over the last 12 years in the Environmental Studies Program. She started the Ceramics program at the Community College of Vermont in Burlington and has also taught at St. Michael's College in Vermont, the Rhode Island School of Design, and her own studio school, Springhouse Pottery, in Charlotte, Vermont.

Susan will explain how these principles of artistic creation have influenced her mentors and herself.
She will also speak to the power of nature as a source of inspiration in her work.

• WORKSHOP: Weaving With Natural Materials Using an Ancient Technique called Japanese Strone Weaving Wed, June 2: 9:00 am -12 noon; Thurs, June 3: 9:00 am -12 noon; Fri, June 4: 9:00 am -12 noon

Rediscover the natural world by learning to weave with local found materials such as vines, leaves, branches, grasses, stems of flowers, tree and shrub prunings, and any natural material you can find in your garden, field, or by the road!

Throughout human history and in all cultures, people have created shelters, clothing, storage vessels and more using the local materials around them. In all this work we find the expression of human needs and we see the expression of human desires. In this workshop we will explore a very ancient weaving process called Japanese stone weaving. It is done on a simple loom that I will provide. Weaving possibilities include wall hangings, place mats, table runners, floor mats, window shades and more.

Get ready to explore the plant world around you and create beautiful pieces using the materials that you have gathered from nature!

Textiles and Tea Bags Workshop with Carol Ann Webster

Carol has been drawn to art her entire life and has pursued everything from pen-and-ink drawings to faux finish painting on walls, furniture and cabinets. She now uses the skills accumulated over the years to create and teach mixed media art.

She views herself as a mixed media "Alchemist," using a variety of tools, techniques and materials to make layered, aged and weathered-looking art that

materials to make layered, aged and weathered-looking art that tells a story. She favors the idea of using things beyond their original intent, giving a scrap of fabric or bits of metal new life in a one-of-a-kind piece of art.

Carol loves sharing her knowledge and techniques with others. She has taught dozens of courses, both to artists who want to expand their range of skills and to people who don't consider themselves artists, but want to express their unique creativity. She has found that mixed media is a wonderful way to experience the joy of art in the making of — and the sense of accomplishment in — the finished work.

If you enjoy using recycled, unusual materials in layers, with textures and little embellishments all stitched together, then you'll have a great time in this workshop.

During class, Carol will share her methods for preparing tea bags with

some "added extras" you may want to consider – like how to add color and "rust" marks. She'll reveal some of her favorite sources of materials and provide insight into color and design decisions.

If you are new to mixed media, this is a great chance to "start small" in telling a visual story and gain confidence to widen your creativity.
